

BIBLIOGRAPHY: NON-ONLINE SOURCES

A bibliography is a list of all the sources you used to research your paper. It comes at the end of your report and is written on a separate page. Entries should be in alphabetical order, and if a second line for an individual entry is needed, it should be indented. Here are some examples that closely follow the MLA style:

1. *A book with one author.*

Jones, Patricia. The Changing Worlds of Birds. New York: Holt, 1973.

2. *A book with more than one author:*

Smith, John and Robert Jones. The Nightwatchers. New York: Four Winds Press. 1980.

3. *A book with no author:*

The World Almanac. New York: Newspaper Enterprise Assoc., 1999.

4. *A book with an editor:*

Scott, Marion H. (ed.) Birds of America. Chicago: Follett, 1972.

5. *Pamphlets:*

Leahy, Christopher. "An Introduction to Massachusetts Birds." Massachusetts Audubon Society, Inc., 1992.

6. *An encyclopedia article:*

Friedmann, Herbert. "Birds." World Book Encyclopedia. Chicago: World Book, Inc., 2007.

7. *Magazine:*

Carlson, Peter. "That First Season." Time. 7 November 1999: 37-38.

8. *Personal Interview:*

Smith, Robert. Personal interview. 23 September 2007.
